CO2 monitors for an even healthier SEPS

School Council were pleased to welcome Amy Lewis to last Tuesday's meeting.

Amy is one of our parents who applied for the Schools Upgrade Grant and was successful. Awesome Amy.

Thanks to Amy, SEPS has received a \$25,000 grant from the federal government - the fund was set up to manage COVID risk in schools by improving ventilation and air quality.

The funds will be used to purchase 45 CO2 monitors for classrooms and staff areas.

Amy's initiative will help our students thrive in an even safer learning environment.

Why is co2 important?

As we breathe out, we exhale CO2. Increased CO2 rates can indicate higher levels of "rebreathed" air accumulating in a room, therefore poor ventilation.

This is important because higher levels of "rebreathed air" represent an increased risk of catching COVID, colds, flus, and other airborne viruses if someone in the room is sick.

The monitor lets us know when the levels are too high, and we can act like opening some windows slightly, turning on a fan and other simple strategies - along with HEPA filters, this is a great passive risk reduction tool.

At a level of 2,000 **1 in 25** breaths is rebreathed, as compared to a level of 600 where it is only 1 in 200. (Kids breathe at a rate of 18-30 breaths per minute). A level of 600-800 indicates a well-ventilated room.

Studies also show high CO2 levels impair cognition and concentration as well as increase fatigue (we all know that feeling of being a bit tired in a stuffy room), so it's hoped that the system will improve learning outcomes by decreasing absenteeism, but also improving air health within classrooms.

Funds are slated to arrive in late May or early June with installation from July onwards (depending on delivery timeframes) - just in time for the winter cold and flu season.

Well done Amy and thank you on behalf of us all.

Another brilliant week for Levels 1 and 2! Although the weather has been cold, our hearts have been warmed by all of the wonderful things happening in the JLC.



4 things about nutrition panels

Information on food labels can be confusing, but when you know how to read them, you'll find that the label is the best source of information about a product.

- > Labels make comparing different products much easier.
- Food Labelling requirements specify that all packaged food products contain a nutrition panel listing: energy, protein, total fat, saturated fat, total carbohydrate, total sugar and sodium content.
- You can use the nutrition information panel to compare similar products in the supermarket. For example, by using the information per 100g, you could find out which of two types of cereal is higher in fibre, or which of two yoghurts is lower in fat.
- All packaged products must carry an ingredients list. Ingredients must be listed in descending order of weight. This means the first ingredient listed contributed the largest amount and the last ingredient listed contributed the least.
- What to look for on labels:
 - Aim for >3q total fibre per serve of bread and breakfast cereal
 - o <10g total fat per 100g is usually a good choice, try for less.
 - Aim for snacks with a 450-600kJ or less per serve and <30g total carbohydrates or less per serve.
